GENERAL WALKS & OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES

Sunday, 20th October: A Sunday saunter around Middleton Park

A pleasant (and historically informative) walk with Edna and June through woods and open fields, beginning and ending at the popular café in the Visitor Centre. Leeds Combined Arts provides monthly WALKS, designed to suit people who prefer a gentle steady walk of between two and six miles. These walks are at a moderate pace and are ideal for those who would like to become fitter and enjoy walking but would not be up to doing a longer walk at a faster pace.

During the walk we usually incorporate some Poetry, Storytelling or music. We sometimes include visits to a Stately Home or Art Gallery or other place of interest. Although these walks are of a shorter length, please consider your ability when attending and <u>always come suitably equipped</u>, i.e. waterproofs, walking boots and warm clothing. Packed lunch sometimes needed.

We want everyone to enjoy the walks LCA provides. However, sometimes unforeseen circumstances intervene (i.e. a train or bus strike) at short notice. Should such an event take place please check your email (or What's App) for any re-arrangements.

Thank you for your patience and cooperation – we will always try our best to provide a pleasant walking experience for you.

Also, we need members to 'step-in' throughout the year to organise walks. It is quite easy and fun to do. Jon and I can give plenty of guidance. LCA email/phone contact is 0113-234-7688 or 0774-961-2270. Walks usually begin/end via bus/rail connection (train spotting is optional!). Occasionally, with no transport links we will organise car-sharing.

Walks & Outdoor Activities

PARK WALKS

The idea for these short gentle strolls began during the pandemic when visiting Burley Park for my daily exercise. I started to research the history of Leeds parks and was amazed to discover we have over 60 community parks of all shapes and sizes to enjoy. Since the walks began (in July 2023) we have visited parks across Leeds, each with its own features to admire and history to tell. The Japanese garden at Horsforth Hall Park, the hidden 1691 sundial in Micklefield Park, the stunning views from the top of Bramley Park, the memorial to the Barnbow Ladies in Manston Park, the fishing lake at Nunroyd Park and the rolling landscape of Gott's Park are some of the highlights that spring to mind. (A booklet with details of the first 6 walks is currently available, with the next issue due to come out in December.)

The walks take place each month throughout the year on a Tuesday morning ending with a cafe stop, with additional Thursday afternoon walks with picnic stops during the summer months. Walks take about 30 to 40 minutes at a gentle pace with plenty of opportunity to enjoy the open air and chat to your companions. An email is sent out each month, giving details of the planned walking route, buses, car parking, toilets, refreshment stop and potted history.

The remaining walks for 2024 are:

12th November - Beckett's Park - meet at HEART CENTRE, Headingley 11am

3rd December (not 10th as originally listed) - Royal Park - meet at the Left Bank Centre 11 am

The LCA Committee held a meeting on Sunday,29th September, during which a wide range of topics was discussed. Votes were taken and it was unanimously agreed:

- To increase performance evening fees from £3.50 to £4.00 for non-members, (£3.50 for members).
- To relinquish the Pulse Room, (giving one month's notice to the admin team at Heart) should largescale funding NOT be forthcoming by December 2024.
- To possibly relinquish the LCA (now out of date) floor banners (which are at present with a Company called 'Award Banners' in Holbeck).

Committee Business

- To renew theatre visits, sending out a preliminary letter to gauge initial interest. (We have already received a positive response to this proposal).
- To arrange an emergency Committee meeting in January 2025 should funding be running out.

News from The Chair

Information Update from the Chairperson:

The following provides information concerning the progress the LCA has made since the AGM (held on Thursday, 18th April 2024).

- 1.1 Excellent progress has been made in networking and obtaining presenters for the Performance Evenings until February or possibly March 2025. (Attendance at The Ilkley Literary Festival in October may create more promising opportunities.) Some contacts (like Arts Together and Voluntary Action Leeds) have provided invaluable training on a range of topics, i.e. how best to contact new people and supporting those who may be vulnerable/ distressed.
- **1.2** Both General and Park Walks have held steady despite very poor weather conditions. The Book Group has also been a constant factor and continues to be very enjoyable and sociable. People have occasionally got in touch to make general enquiries. Relationships with The Heart Centre have been good and the staff are consistently very helpful.

News from The Chair

- **1.3** Four attempts to obtain grants have been unavailing, despite LCA members kindly contributing ideas, suggesting improvements and contributing testimonies. There's a sense that little more can be done in this area. We are waiting to hear of one (large) Grant outcome; we should know by December 2024.(Please see **1.4** below.)
- **1.4** A fifth and final grant application was made earlier this month great care being taken to address all of the reasons for not having received a grant the last time. It seems most probable that, due to pressure on funds, the grant holders themselves have been unable to provide grants to all applicants. The best course of action seems that of **not** requesting any further large grants at this present time.
- 1.5 JS has been looking into the availability of small grants to tide us over the next few months. She has just completed a small grant application with a company called Arnold Clark and is waiting to hear from them. It's hoped that this grant will help to cover our general running costs. It could possibly also cover costs for Afternoon Art Classes (for which a demand has quite spontaneously surfaced.)
